He would stand there for a while to catch his breath and analyze his thoughts, and finally begins his prayer. "Kodéé' Hozhóo Dooleełgo át'é, as he sprinkles white corn meal from his little pouch and acknowledges the sacredness to the east. He would identify himself by his warrior name, while acknowledging Mother Earth and Father Sky and the Morning Deities in Yikáíh and Haashch'ééh Dine'é. Through serene calm he utters in a distinct voice, "Hózhóo Dooleeł, Shimá Nahasdzáán, Shitaa' Yádiłhił, Hayoołkááł Haashch'ééyááłti'í Shicheii,

Yák'aashbaah bee hodéezyéél biyiji' kodóó hózhóogo nihich'i' dóó nihiyiji' hanáádeesdzih Diyin Dine'é danohlíinii." He relates to the environment and acknowledges nature and the most beautiful things on and within, one that has sacred significance in human nature, birds, animals and plant growth. However long he wants to pray, will depend on his thoughts and analogical thought that morning. Most times, important aspects of his prayer are usually concentrated on good health and well-being. He prays for good blessings for his children, grandchildren, love ones in his immediate family and relatives far and near. He usually does not acknowledge himself until conclusion of his prayer, just as generations of forefathers did before him. Fortunately, we as Nihookáá' Dine'é still have the opportunity to learn and cling to our language and cultural heritage through spirituality in this life, just as grandpa did and for our grandchildren to do in the future.
