

Aneth Community Court graduated three participants with five cases during the 4th quarter of Fiscal Year 2014. Treatment included Peacemaking Session, Family Violence Prevention Education, Parenting Class, Apology letters, Essay Writing, Presentation at Aneth Community Court Resource Meetings and Local Chapter Meetings. Participants performed a total of 78 hours of Community Service Work. Currently, Aneth Community Court has zero recidivism rate of all those who graduated.

Aneth Community Court-Garden Project



Beginning of June 2014, Aneth Community Court collaborated with the Asset Base Community Development (ABCD) Project at Homer Dale Community Farm at St. Christopher Mission Church of Bluff, Utah. ABCD-Project is overseen by Utah Disability Council, Elsie Dee. The involvement does not only give an opportunity for the Aneth Community Court's participants to fulfill their court obligation, community services hours, but to have the participants gain knowledge of quality food and nutrition, grow important life skills, increase time for reflection and restoration, and positive change in attitudes. We planted, maintained, and cultivated throughout the months of June, July, August and September 2014. We take pride of the participants, Utah Disability Council members, Aneth District Court, and community members' contribution to the garden project since we witness the result of our labor.













"ABCD (Asset Base Community Development) has currently involved the Aneth Court/Resource Staffs, with the Homer Dale Garden Project this spring (2014). Ms. Clorissa Thomas, has been very instrumental and having other clients being involved in the Homer Dale Garden Project. I am very thankful from the local community involvement and support of this project and continue the partnership and planning of the ABCD Project. We have seen the accomplishment of the Homer Dale garden Project and the hard work we had seen, the planning, plowing, planting, seeing it grow, setting the water pipes, irrigating, hoeing on weekly base. Now we are seeing the growth of our garden. We had planted Indian Corns, Squash & Zucchinis."






What is the Purpose of a Resource Meeting?
