## Funding:

• Each year, the U.S. Department of Justice (USDOJ) awards funding to hundreds of AI/AN communities through the Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation (CTAS) grant process for tribal government specific grant programs. The one application process with 8 grant components, created in 2010 is used to address tribal needs to enhance law enforcement practices and sustain crime prevention and intervention efforts on a comprehensive basis in the following Purpose Areas (PA):


- PA 1: Public Safety and Community Policing (COPS)
- PA 2: Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems Strategic Planning (BJA)
- PA 3: Justice systems, and alcohol and substance abuse (BJA)
- PA 4: Corrections and Correctional Alternatives (BJA)
- PA 5: Violence against women (OVW-TSASP)
- PA 6: Children's Justice Act Partnerships for Indian Communities (OVC)
- PA 7: Comprehensive Tribal Victim Assistance program (OVC)
- PA 8: Juvenile Healing to Wellness Courts (OJJDP)
- PA 9: Tribal Youth Program (OJJDP)

In 2014, the Navajo Nation received funding under Purpose Areas 2, 5 & 7.

- Scope: Comprehensive Assessment of the justice system that will guide the development of a Tribal Action Plan
- **History:** Tribal Action Plan was created in 1990 and approved under legislation CO-68-90.

Criminal Justice Summit, Fall 2015: The Criminal Justice Summit in Fall of 2015 had representation from all judicial districts. Those in attendance did a Fears/Needs assessment exercise that identified our top fears and needs as:

- 1. Domestic Violence/Elder Abuse
- 2. Substance Abuse
- 3. Suicide
- 4. Lack of Resources: law enforcement and prosecutors



- May 13, 2016: Navajo Nation President Begaye and Chief Justice Sloan sign a joint letter directing both branches to work together on one tribal action plan.
- Coordination of Federal and Tribal Agencies: SAMHSA and USDOJ have assigned Technical Assistance Providers to assist us in the development of the TAP: ONE document that will serve the purposes of both Federal agencies for funding.
- **Tribal Action Plan Workshop, August 1-3, 2016:** Over 170 participants from all over the reservation. Service providers, community members, non-profit organizations, Indian Health Service, Tribal Court Judges, youth and non-governmental agencies were represented. Website under construction
